Context



Bangladesh is a disaster-prone country, primarily due to its geographical location. Bangladesh is high on the list of countries most vulnerable to climate change, ranking seventh on the 2021 World Climate Risk Index (National Adaptation Plan 2023-50). Although climate change is a global problem, the level of vulnerability caused by it is became a huge challenge in Bangladesh. Bangladesh emits only 0.14 percent of greenhouse gasses, a negligible contribution to climate change compared to the biggest emitters. Being a low-lying delta nation, Bangladesh is extremely vulnerable to the impacts of climate change through sea-level rise, floods, and cyclones. This underlines the dire need for comprehensive policies and international cooperation to mitigate the challenges presented by climate change.

For this reason, ActionAid Bangladesh and Brighters Society of Bangladesh have been jointly organizing "Bangladesh Youth COP" every year to accelerate the global climate justice movement. As a part of this year's program, youth voices were captured regarding the verification and recommendation for the needs generated due to climate change in Satkhira, Kurigram, Sunamganj, Bandarban and Cox's Bazar district. By analyzing these needs, three Regional Youth COPs were organized to address the ongoing crisis through grassroot consultation. Followed by these events, a national consultation was held to validate the data articulated from the grassroot level. More than 150 young people coming from various climate vulnerable areas contributed their constructive insights based on the experience of their grassroot level activism. With their collective efforts a new tool advocacy document was developed to strengthen the foundation of rebuilding Bangladesh 2.0 focusing on climate justice.



- Making sure of alternative communication channel running during disasters in vulnerable areas


Area Covered of National & Regional Youth COP 2024


